STATEMENT BY HON DR. SALIM AHMED SALIM, FORMER PRIME MINISTER OF THE UNITED REPUBLIC OF TANZANIA AT THE COMMEMORATION OF THE 61st ANNIVERSARY OF THE COMMONWEALTH ON 8TH MARCH 2010

We have to look at ways of forging genuine partnerships and networks in sharing scientific knowledge, assisting less advanced members in capacity building in the areas of science and research, finding new ways of addressing global problems and formulating new technologies that will build a more equitable and sustainable future for the peoples of the Commonwealth.
